Washington Homebrewers Association (WAHA) Formation

On November 15th, Doug Buffett and Mark Emiley met up with representatives of several other homebrew clubs to officially form the Washington Homebrewers Association. The goals of this group are to assist Washington homebrewers and homebrewing clubs in the advancement of homebrewing in Washington. While not being a club itself, it will serve as a launching board for coordinating club activities, getting new brewers started and hooked up with local resources, and to organize larger activities in Washington (like reforming Washington's home brewing and home winemaking laws, preparing for bringing the National Homebrewing Conference to Seattle, BJCP training coordination, a Washington Homebrewing Awards program, and other functions).

We prepared a letter which was distributed to all registered Washington homebrew clubs to muster representatives and support. The letter is included in this Press. You will notice that the above list is not complete. That's right, **the office of President is still unoccupied and very open**. Unfortunately, the Nominating Committee was not able to identify any candidates prior to last month's elections that were willing to accept this position. Time is running out and we really need to find a volunteer who will serve in this capacity. Lest you think that we can leave this position open, you may be surprised to learn that as a Boeing club we are required by Recreation to have a fully populated Executive Board. **If a vacancy exists for more than 60 days, BEWBC will be officially "decertified" by Boeing Recreation. Seriously. We will lose our status and all rights as a club**, including our ability to meet together and to store our equipment on Boeing premises. So, if we do not identify a club president **before March**, there will be no more on-site grape crushes, no club store, no more on-premise meetings, no use of Boeing e-mail or any other provided services; i.e., **no more BEWBC**. Obviously, this is not in our best interest. We've come too far to let that happen.

Please give some serious thought to volunteering for this position. In order to maintain as much continuity in the club as possible, we would very much like to fill the president's position at our **January 24th** membership meeting. As a past club president, I can honestly tell you that this is a very rewarding job, and not as demanding as you might expect. Sure, there is a certain level of effort required, but this is not the most time-consuming job in our club. And you needn't be an expert in the art of wine or beer making, either. The position is one of leadership and facilitating, not technical knowledge, and primarily involves acting as a liaison between Recreation and the club and helping coordinate activities for the rest of the board. The majority of the job is collecting member inputs for the needs and direction of the club and directing people to the most appropriate board or club member for help.

We challenge you to consider whether you would be willing to serve in this position. This job is flexible enough to allow you to take it to the level you desire, whether maintaining current operations or developing new directions and emphasis for the club. If you would like to volunteer yourself or nominate a fellow club member, please contact one of the members of this year's Nominating Committee below or any of our current Executive Board officers. Our club is a cooperative effort, which takes a lot of coordination to manage at our level, but the effort is quite manageable when we all chip in. We have all benefited from the past efforts of our volunteers. Please consider whether you might be able to give back by helping to lead us forward in the coming year.

January Membership Meeting: Wine Maker's Forum

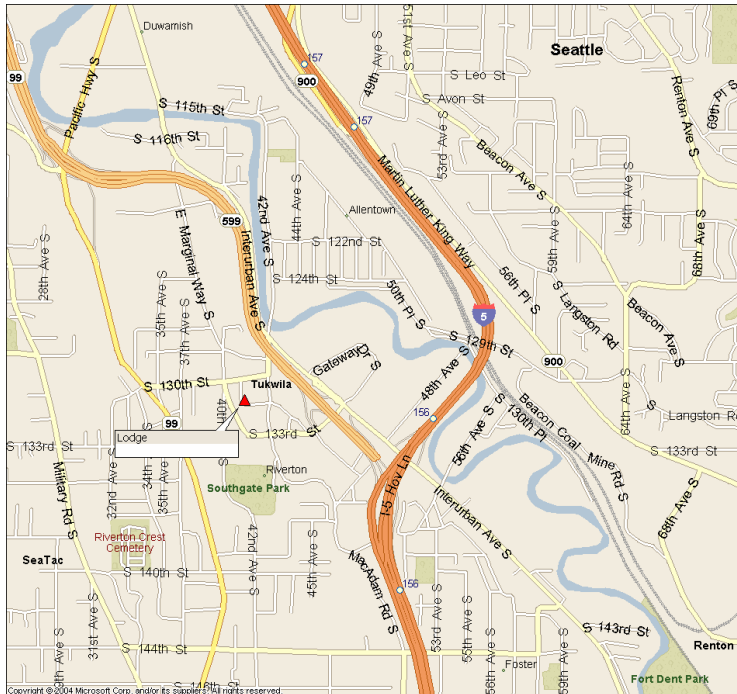

Announcements

Fellow Washington Homebrewers,

We are writing you today in the spirit of elevating the Washington homebrewing community to a new level. We are privileged to live and brew in an area with great locally grown ingredients, nestled where the craft brewing movement took roots. We have a wide variety of clubs and a respectable selection of homebrew stores. As individuals and local organizations, we have made some great beer and put on some exciting events and competitions.

However, in the overall national scene, Washington homebrew has been poorly represented. We have not had a beer place in the second round of the National Homebrew Competition for two years. Our laws technically prohibit us from organizing any sort of homebrewing event where people meet to share great homebrewed beer. We have many clubs operating a few miles apart from each other putting on lectures, classes, and events, yet they don't have any idea of what great things the others are doing.

Over the past year, the level of inter-club communication has risen dramatically. Clubs have begun to organize joint meetings to bring in higher profile guests and promote healthy and vigorous competition, all in the spirit of brewing better and happier. These interactions promote the flow of information, make better use of resources, and allow us to take a better look at where the hobby is, where it can go, and what we can do to get it there. With improved communication and coordination, we can raise the bar on homebrewing in Washington.

It is with these thoughts in mind that a cadre of homebrewers representing a group of clubs have come together to begin the organization of the Washington Homebrewers Association (WAHA). The mission of this organization is to:

- **Promote Washington Homebrewing**
- **Foster Communication and Participation in Washington's Homebrewing Culture**
- **Recognize Excellence in Washington's Homebrewing Skills and Contributions to the Homebrewing Society**
- **Promote Washington's Image as a Homebrewing state**

In order to pursue this mission, the WAHA has set some initial goals for programs:

- Centralized Washington Homebrewing Website
 - One step access to find your local resources and information on how to get brewing and in touch with Washington's homebrewing community
 - Club Locator and Profile Program
 - Information on all of the different clubs in the state and a characterization of their activities (to be updated by clubs)
 - State-Wide Homebrewing / Club Event Calendar
 - A central calendar where homebrewers and clubs from around the state can post homebrewing events, including regularly scheduled club meetings, in order to identify activities to participate in and prevent conflicts
 - A forum for promoting dialogue amongst Washington homebrewers
- Washington Homebrewing Mentoring Program
 - Homebrewers around the state can volunteer to teach beginning or intermediate brewers in their area
- Educational Speaker Program
 - Organized multi-club events aiming to bring a large crowd to hear an expert or guest speaker
- Washington Awards Program
 - Bert Grant Award
 - Recognition of the homebrewer who scores the most points in sanctioned WAHA competitions
 - Washington Homebrew Club of the Year
 - Recognition of the brewing skills and contributions of Washington clubs
 - Washington Homebrewer of the Year
 - Recognition of homebrewers who efforts help progress the Washington Homebrewing scene
- Legislative Action Coordination Program
 - Coordination of the effort to reform our homebrewing laws to promote and nurture our hobby
- Judging Support Program
 - Identification of BJCP judges willing to taste and evaluate local homebrewers' beer
 - Coordination of BJCP study group scheduling
 - Representation of Washington judges and support for judging education classes
- National Homebrewing Conference Preparation
 - Organization for the effort to bring the National Homebrewing Conference to Washington
 - Event orchestration after landing the conference

To that end, it has been recommended that the following committees be formed: Website Development, Awards, Legal, Publicity, Competition, Education, Judging, and the National Homebrewing Conference. For each of these efforts and committees, we will need supporters from around the state.

The ability to accomplish these goals will hinge on the support of the homebrewers who want to see these things happen. This is where the WAHA needs you. In this initial effort, we need capable people to help form and operate these beginning functions. Every club has members with a wide variety of skills. Some people may be great directors, some may have a lot of great contacts, some may have legal and political ties. Some may be great webmasters and software engineers. By pooling our resources and each identifying candidates to help move these initiatives forward, we can bring the best people together to promote homebrewing in Washington.

A major area of concern which has already been discussed is representation of Eastern Washington clubs. The initial formative effort has been comprised of Puget Sound area clubs; however, we have spent much time discussing how to draw in the entire Washington homebrewing community. We feel that with ample e-communications and distribution of responsibility to clubs outside the Puget Sound region, everyone will have a great opportunity to contribute.

We would like your club to designate a contact to act as a liaison to the WAHA. The liaisons will represent your club's ideas and link contributing members of your club with the WAHA, while helping to steer the WAHA in a direction that suits the entire WA homebrewing community.. In addition, we would like to know what homebrew stores you interact with so we may contact them for participation in our effort. Networking of the entire Washington brewing community will greatly enhance our communication abilities and our ability to achieve our goals.

The current contributors of WAHA have identified the following core personnel needs for the organization in addition to the club representatives:

- Website / software designers
- Lawyers / legal advisors
- Political activists
- Publicity representatives
- Brewery liaisons
- Competition coordinators
- Brewing educators / skilled brewers
- Anyone else willing to help as needed

If you can find anyone in your club who can help with these functions, we need them. We want to point out that the WAHA is not intended to be a club, but a coordinated effort working on behalf of the clubs and Washington homebrewers. We want to help support the best efforts of all of our homebrewers to improve everyone's brewing and promote our hobby.

With this feature article, it is probably safe to assume that the competition is going to grow dramatically next year so we will need plenty of help to get ready for the event. Look for some announcements soon about preparing the competition for this year.

Brewing tip of the month: Brew Year's Resolutions

For this month's tip of the month, I'd like to offer some suggestions for New Year's brewing resolutions that can help improve your brewing.

- Brew with another brewer
 - o Nothing opens your eyes to different ways to brew faster than brewing with another homebrewer. What you consider to be normal may be an innovative concept to another brewer, or vice versa. Alternately, something that you are doing may be hurting your brew might be something that you never notice unless someone else pointed it out.
- Teach a friend
 - o The best way to reinforce your understanding of the brewing process is to try to teach someone else. Seeing first hand is always the best way to learn. Take the time to share the hobby and spread your passion.
- Read a new book
 - o Homebrewing is not a stagnant hobby. We are continuing to develop new techniques and refine old ones. New ingredients are becoming available and new (and old) styles are always being developed. Take the time to touch base with the current trends and hone your knowledge.
- Study for the BJCP (Beer Judge Certification Program) exam
 - o While it may seem like a daunting task, taking the time to research and taste all of the different beer styles is possibly the best thing that you can do for your brewing. You develop new perspectives on flavors, ingredients, processes, and styles which allow you to examine your own brewing style and look at new ways to develop your skills. While you can do this on your own, it is best to grab a friend, sit down the BJCP guidelines and some classic examples, and get to tasting.
- Brew some new styles
 - o While it is comforting to sit down and brew your favorite recipe, by trying to brew some different styles, you can broaden your experience spectrum and also improve the recipes that you have been working on. Getting to know different ingredients and techniques used for different styles helps you understand all of the brewing tools at your disposal. Make a goal of brewing a few styles that you haven't brewed before. You may discover a fantastic flavor profile that you never knew you could make.
- Upgrade one aspect of your brewery
 - o There are a ton of relatively small upgrades that you can treat yourself to that will make your brewing a little better or a little more fun. Here are some thoughts:
 - Full boil – Grab a propane burner, chiller, and large pot to make a huge improvement to your beer
 - Wort Oxygenation – Stop shaking your carboy and add some oxygen directly. All you need is a little regulator for an oxygen canister (that you can get at Home Depot) and an aeration stone. Give your yeast that healthy start that they need
 - o Temperature control – Grab a brew belt or fermwrap (or even better, an old fridge) and a thermostat and take control over your fermentation temperatures. This really helps shape the way your yeast go to work on your brew.
 - o Cleaners / Sanitizers – If you have been using bleach for a sanitizer, splurge and try some different cleaners and sanitizers. You may suddenly notice that you aren't getting a medicinal taste in your beer that you just thought was part of homebrewing. One Step, iodophor, Straight A, Star San, etc. They cost a little more, but really can help improve your beer.
